





## How to Make a Pirate Ship Moving Picture

First, draw a blue wavy line half way across a piece of paper or card.


Next, add details to design an ocean scene for above and below the ocean.

Then, ask an adult to help you cut a long slit in the paper along the wavy line. Make sure you do not cut all the way to the edges of your paper, We are making a pocket hole not cutting the paper in half

On a separate piece of paper or card, draw a boat/pirate ship. Cut out your pirate ship.


After that, attach a lolly stick, straw or strip of card to the back of the boat.














Push your boat up through the slit that you made and move it forwards and backwards across your ocean scene.
