Plastic sheet or tarpaulin

Dry grass, leaves
and twigs

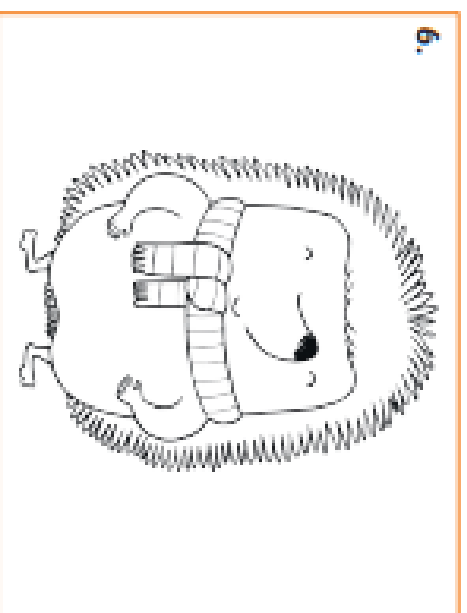
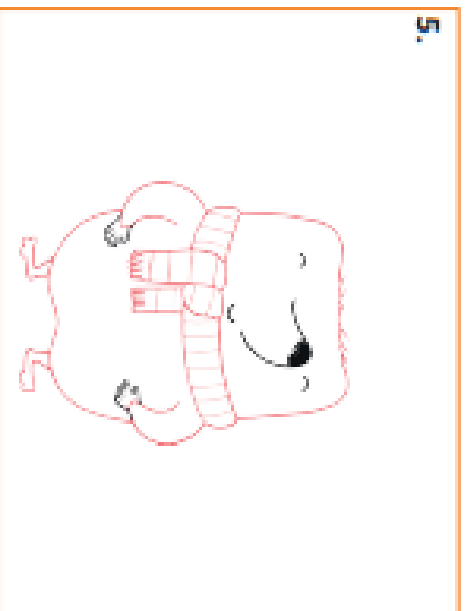
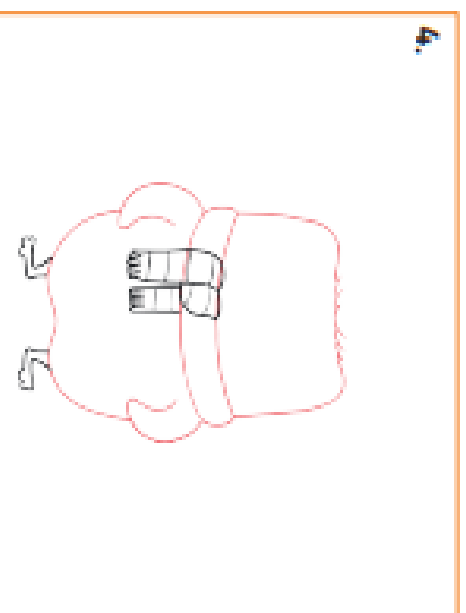
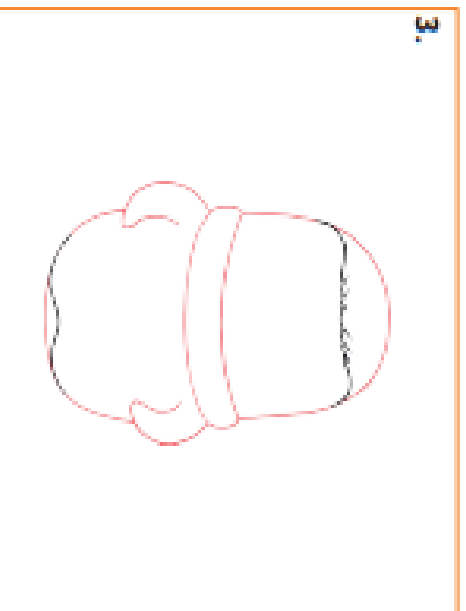
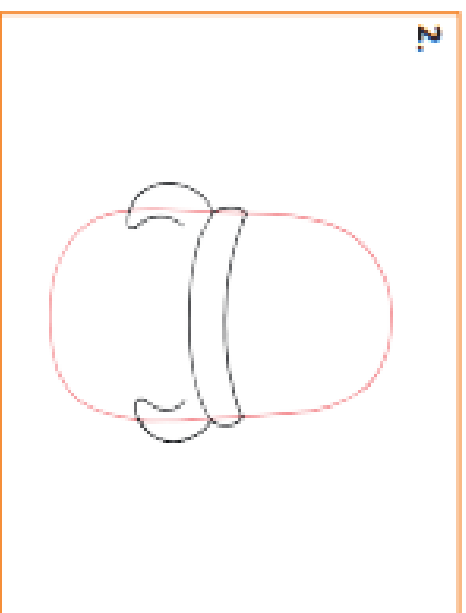
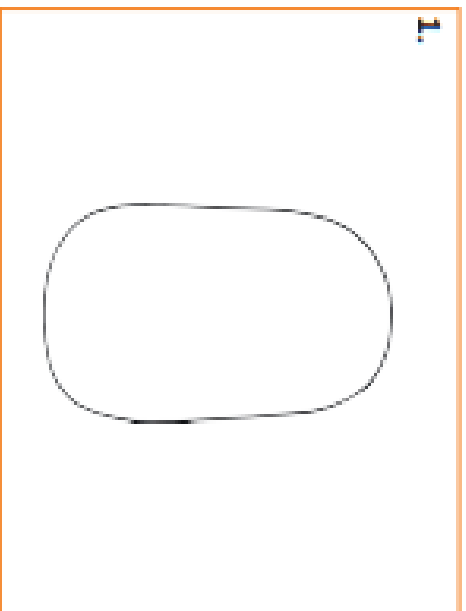
1. Find a quiet, sheltered place (such as under a hedge or leaf pile) in the school grounds to set up your hedgehog hotel. Make sure it's in a place that won't be disturbed!
2. Carefully cut some slits into each side of the box as air holes.
3. Cut a door into the front side of the box. It needs to be about 15cm x 15cm to be big enough.
4. Shred the newspaper and place it inside the box.
5. Place dry grass on top of the newspaper.
6. Cover the box with the plastic sheet to stop it getting wet.
7. Place twigs around the box and cover it with grass and leaves.
8. Leave your hedgehog hotel throughout the winter and try not to disturb it.

Did You Know?

What Is Hibernation?

Hibernation is when some animals go into a very deep sleep during the winter.

In the United Kingdom, animals such as hedgehogs, dormice, toads, queen bees and bats hibernate.



Did You Know?

Hedgehogs

Hedgehogs are nocturnal animals. This means that they sleep during the day and come out to eat at night.

Hedgehogs like to eat insects, snails and worms.

In the winter, when it is really cold, it is harder for them to find food, so they hibernate.

They will stay in hibernation until the spring.

Did You Know?

Hedgehogs

Hedgehogs have around 6000 spines on their body.

Hedgehogs roll into a tight ball if they are scared. Their spikes make it hard for other animals to attack them.



Did You Know?

Hedgehogs

Hedgehogs make a nest of dry leaves and grass to keep themselves warm.

They never hibernate outside their nests but they will sometimes wake up and move to a new nest before going back to sleep.

Hedgehogs lose a lot of weight when they hibernate, so when they emerge from their sleep, they need to find food very quickly.

Did You Know?

Dormice

The hazel dormouse is a member of the rodent family.

They have a fluffy tail, golden-brown fur and large brown eyes. They are very small.



Did You Know?

Dormice

Dormice spend a lot of time asleep! Their name comes from the French word 'dormir', which means 'to sleep'.



Did You Know?

Dormice

Dormice hibernate between October and April. They roll themselves into a ball and go to sleep on the ground in a nest of leaves and grass.

In order to survive hibernation, dormice need to eat lots of food during the summer and autumn.



Did You Know?

Toads

Toads begin their lives as tadpoles.

Their skin contains poison, which the toad will release if it is feeling threatened by other animals.

Toads are nocturnal and mostly come out at night-time to feed on insects. They burrow beneath the earth or hide under leaves in the day.



Did You Know?

Toads

Common toads usually hibernate between October and March.

They hibernate in the bases of hedgerows, under deep piles of leaves, in logs, burrows, or drainpipes.



Did You Know?

Queen Bees

A bee hive can contain between 10,000 and 60,000 bees but only one is a queen bee.

The queen bee will lay around 1500 eggs a day.

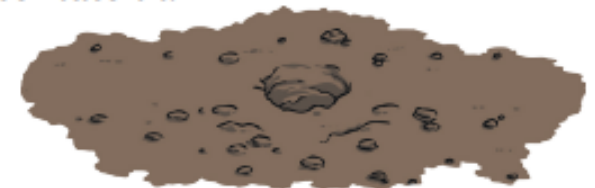


Did You Know?

Queen Bees

Queen bumblebees can hibernate for up to nine months of the year.

They hibernate in soil. The queen bee will dig down about 10cm below the ground. She will then make a little hole to hibernate in.



Did You Know?

Bats

Bats are flying mammals.

They are nocturnal animals, which means that they only come out at night-time.

Bats find their way in the dark by making noises. They wait to hear an echo bouncing back off objects around them to help find their way. Most bats feed on insects.



Did You Know?

Bats

Bats go into hibernation from November until March or April.

They often hibernate in disused buildings, old trees or caves.

Bats might hibernate on their own or in small groups.

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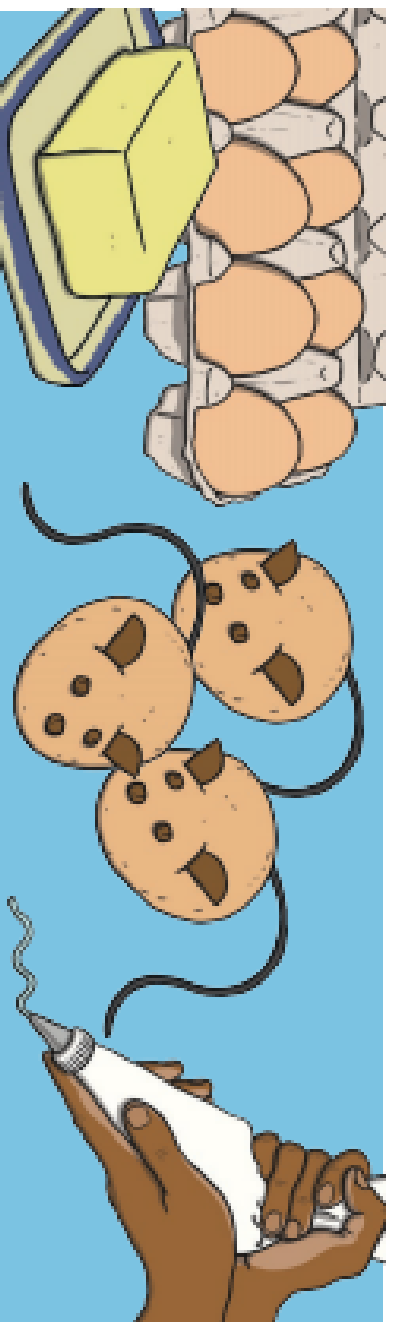

Delicious Dormice Dunkers

Dylan, Dexter and Doris would love this tasty and cute hibernation treat.

Ingredients

Makes approx. 20 dunkers.

400g plain flour

100g sugar

150g unsalted butter

1 large egg

1 tsp vanilla extract

$\frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt

White chocolate buttons

Milk chocolate chips

Edible liquorice laces

A tube of white icing

A large glass of milk (optional)

Equipment

An oven

A baking tray

Baking parchment

1 large bowl

1 smaller bowl

A wooden spoon

A tablespoon

A knife

Method

1. Preheat your oven to 350° C or gas mark 4 and line a baking tray with some baking parchment.
2. Put the flour and salt into a small bowl and mix them together.
3. Put the butter into a large bowl. Using the wooden spoon, beat the butter until it becomes soft, pale and fluffy. Slowly mix in the sugar whilst you are stirring.
4. Next, add the vanilla extract and the egg. Mix it well.
5. Slowly add the flour and salt mixture into the butter and sugar mixture, stirring constantly. Be careful not to add the flour too quickly or your mixture will become lumpy.
6. When your mixture has become like a dough, take around 1 tsp of it in your hands and make it into an egg shape. Place each egg shape onto the lined baking tray. You may want to pinch the 'nose' of the mouse to make it pointy.
7. Bake the dunkers in the oven for around 20 minutes, until they are golden brown and remove to cool.
8. When they are cold, use a small blob of icing to stick chocolate chips where the eyes and nose would go. Add two small blobs of icing where the ears should go. Using a knife, cut a chocolate button in half and push it into the icing. Finally, add a blob of icing where the mouse's tail should go and attach your liquorice lace.
9. Pour a big glass of milk. Dip in your Delicious Dormice Dunker and enjoy!



Hearty Hibernation Hotpot

Hattie will be cosy in no time with this warming winter stew.

Ingredients

Makes 4-6 servings.

- 1 large onion
- 3 stalks of celery
- 3 carrots
- 3 large potatoes
- 100g split red lentils
- 2 vegetable stock cubes
- 1 tin chopped tomatoes
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- Water
- Salt and pepper to taste

Method

1. Turn on the slow cooker and allow it to warm up.
2. Whilst you are waiting, dice the onion and chop up the celery, carrots and potatoes into small chunks, around 2cm long.
3. Place the vegetable stock cubes into the slow cooker. Using hot water from the kettle, pour a small amount of water into the slow cooker and stir until the stock cubes have dissolved.
4. Add the olive oil, diced onion, the chopped vegetables, the split red lentils and the tin of chopped tomatoes into the slow cooker. Stir the mixture together with a wooden spoon.
5. Using the rest of the water from the kettle, top up the slow cooker until it is around $\frac{3}{4}$ full. Stir the ingredients together.
6. Put on the lid and cook on a high heat for 4-6 hours. Alternatively, cook on a low heat for 8-10 hours.
7. When the vegetables and lentils are tender, add salt and pepper to taste and serve with a warm, crusty roll as a warming winter treat.

Tin opener

Hedgehog Biscuits



Ingredients

- 600g plain flour
- $\frac{3}{4}$ tsp baking powder
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp baking soda
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt
- 280g caster sugar
- 240g melted butter
- $3\frac{1}{2}$ tbsp golden syrup
- 2 eggs
- 1 tbsp vanilla extract
- 80g desiccated coconut
- 190g chocolate chips
- Extra chocolate chips for decoration.

Method

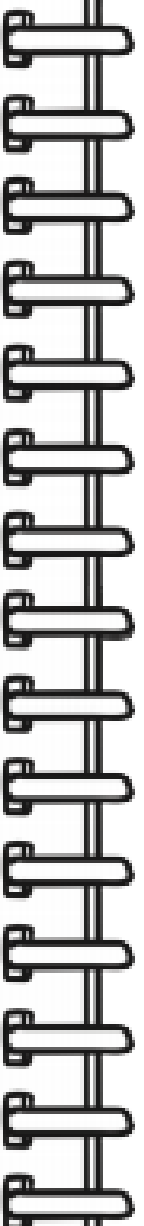
1. First, mix the flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt in a bowl.
2. In a separate bowl, whisk the caster sugar, butter, golden syrup, eggs and vanilla extract.
3. Next, stir the sugar mixture into the flour mixture until just combined into a dough. Refrigerate the dough for 30 minutes to an hour until chilled.
4. Preheat the oven to 175°C and line three baking sheets with greaseproof paper.
5. Use a tablespoon to scoop balls of dough onto the lined trays. Shape the balls into teardrop-shaped biscuits and flatten the pointed side of each biscuit to form the 'face'.
6. Bake in the oven for 10 to 12 minutes until golden. Leave to cool on the baking sheets for 10 minutes before removing the biscuits to a wire rack.
7. Melt the chocolate chips in a bowl above a saucepan of simmering water, stirring frequently.
8. Dip the top of each biscuit in the melted chocolate and spread to cover the 'body' of the hedgehog. Press the biscuits, chocolate-side down, into the desiccated coconut forming the 'spines'.
9. Dip 3 extra chocolate chips into the melted chocolate and place on the pointed end of each biscuit for eyes and a nose. Leave to set for 30 minutes.
10. Finally, enjoy your hedgehog biscuit with a glass of cold milk.

Makes 20 - 24 biscuits

'I Love You to the Moon' Father's Day Card

Supplies

- Blue or black card
- Coloured paper
- Star stickers
- Felt pens
- Scissors
- Stiff card
- Pencil

- Ruler
- Glue stick
- Small photograph
- Speech bubble cut out



1 Fold the blue or black card in half to form a card template.



2 Now make a slit in the card for the rocket to slide through. To do this, use a pencil and ruler to draw a faint line going from the top to the bottom of the card, about 2cm in from the fold. Then cut along this line, leaving around 2cm at the top and the bottom.



3 Now make a rocket using the different coloured paper. To do this, we drew around a rectangle for the main rocket, a triangle for the top, some circles for the window and then cut them out.



4 Position the different shapes to make the rocket, then stick them down using glue.



5 Cut the photograph into a circle shape, then glue in to place.



6 Cut out the phrase 'I love you to the moon and back' and stick it onto the card. Remember to leave space for the rocket.



7 Now decorate the main part of the card to create a background for the rocket. We have used a crescent shaped moon and some stars.



8 Finally cut a strip of stiff card and glue on to the back of the rocket. Then thread the strip through the slit in the card. You now have a moving rocket on the card!

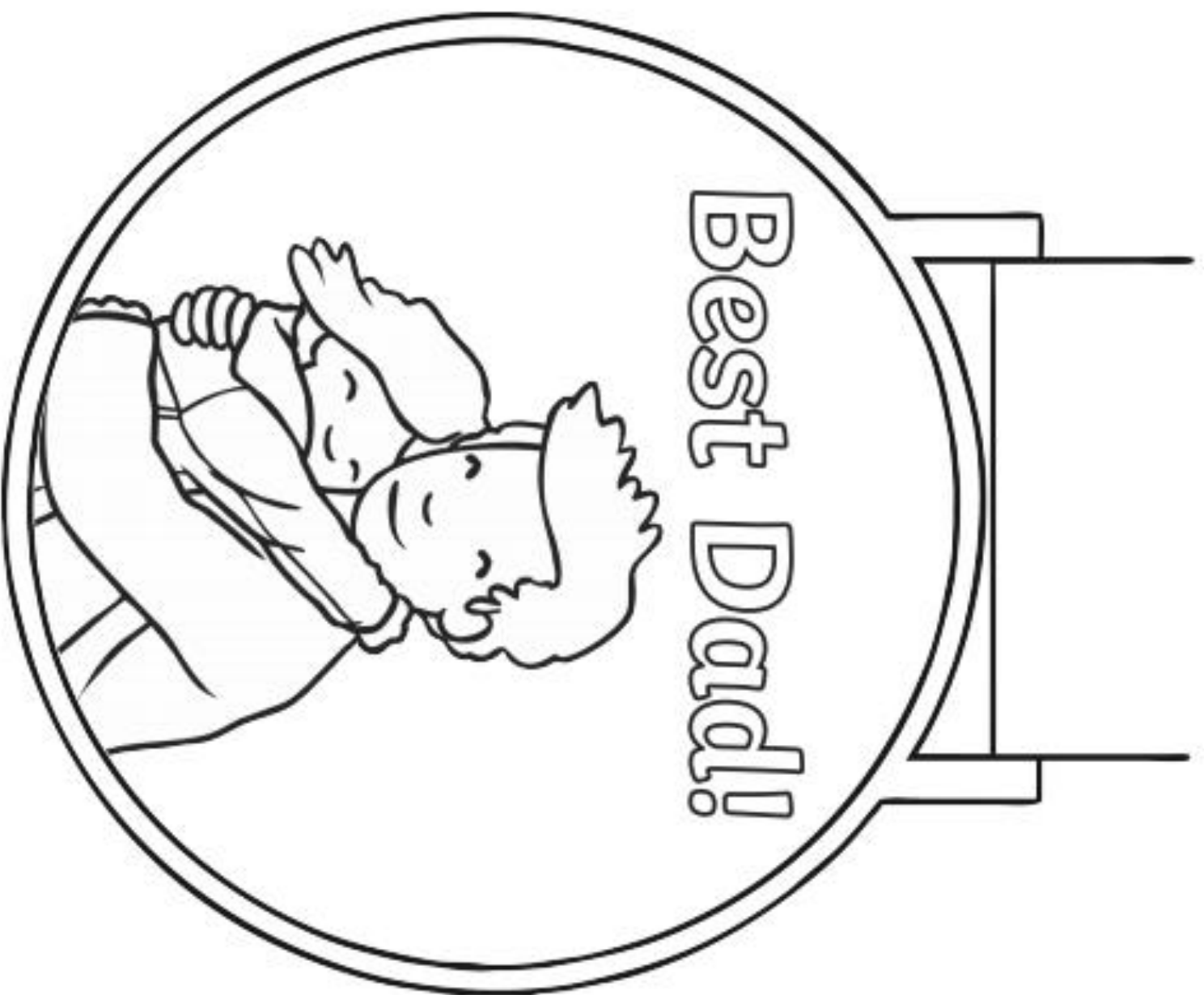

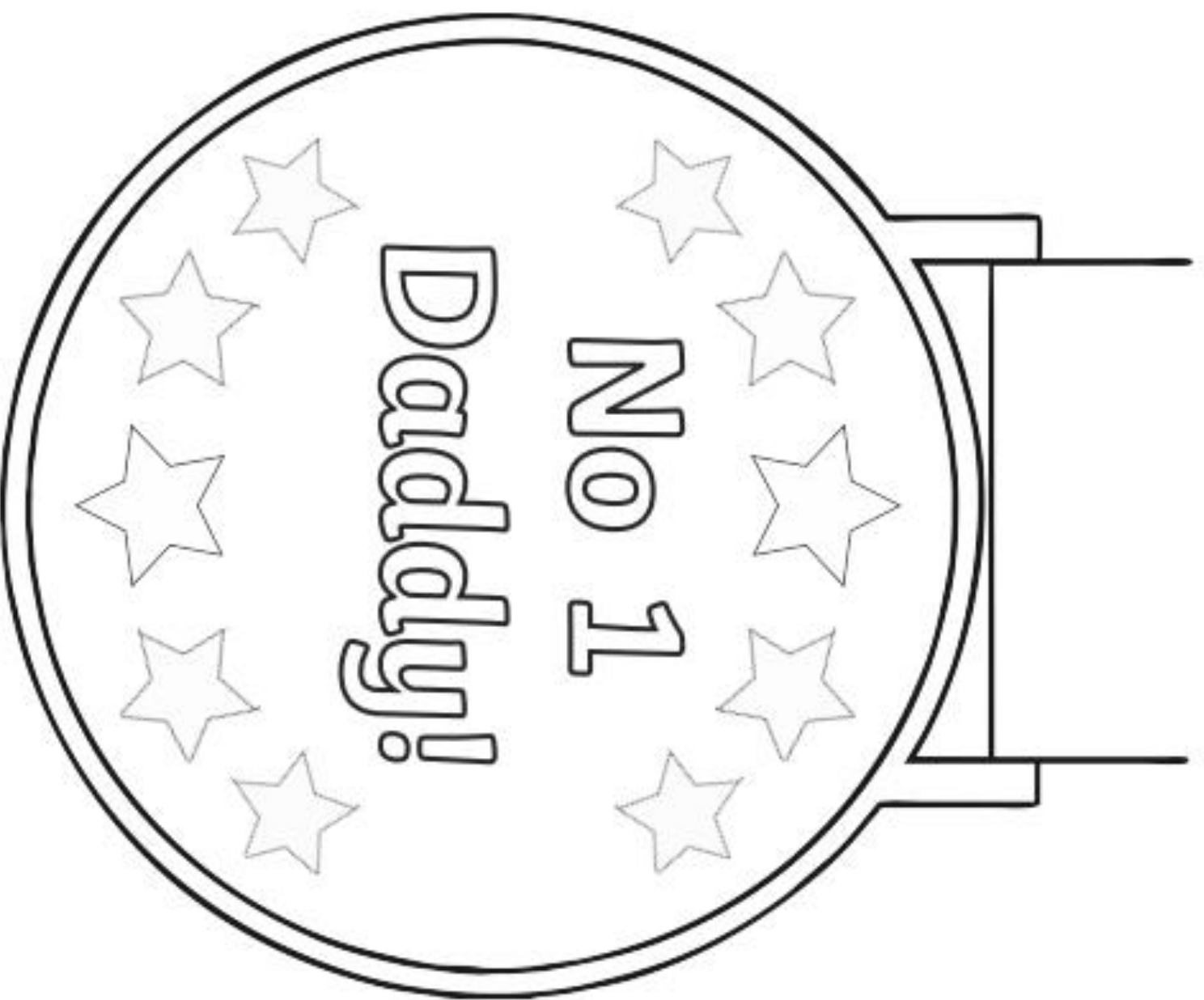

3D Father's Day Trophy

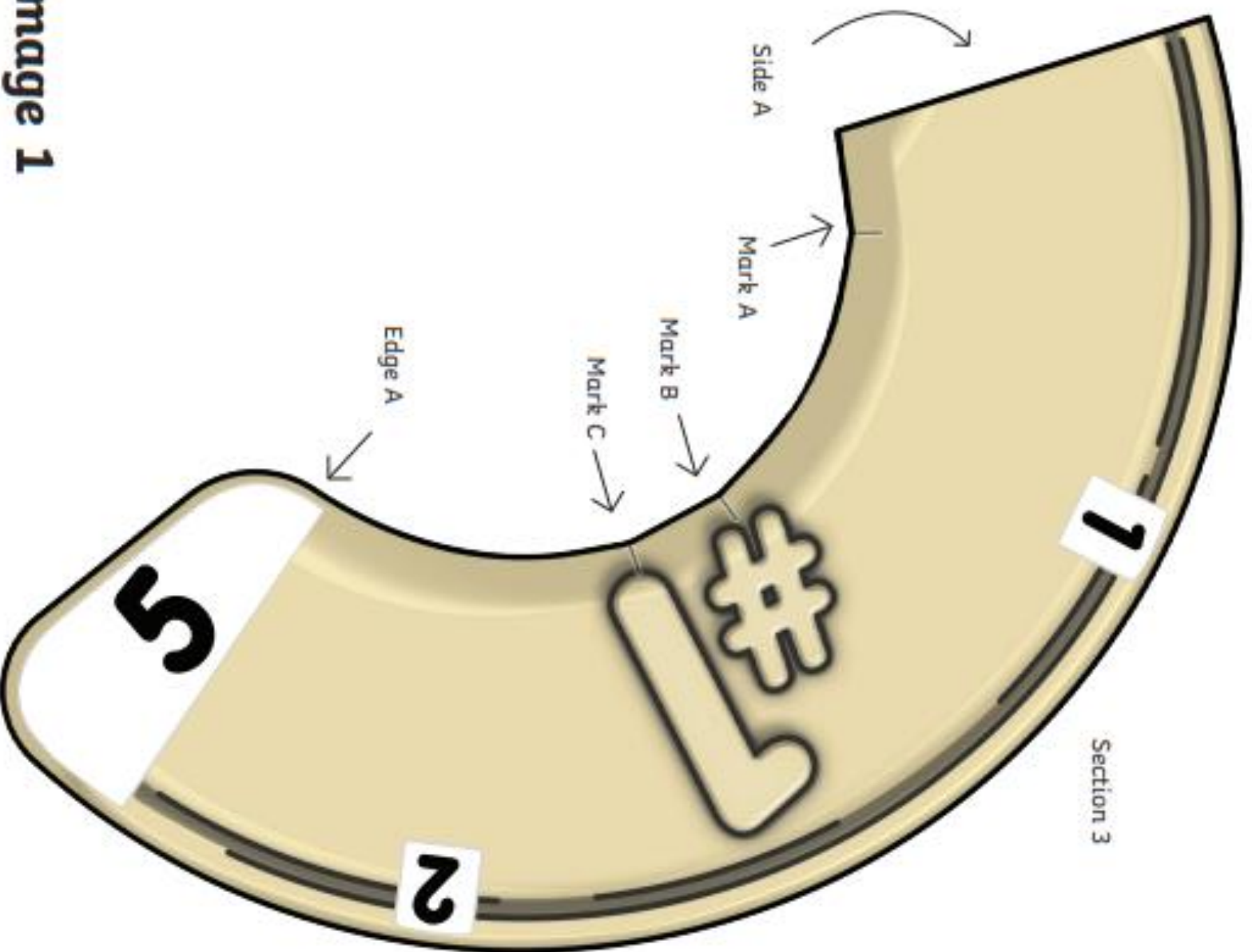

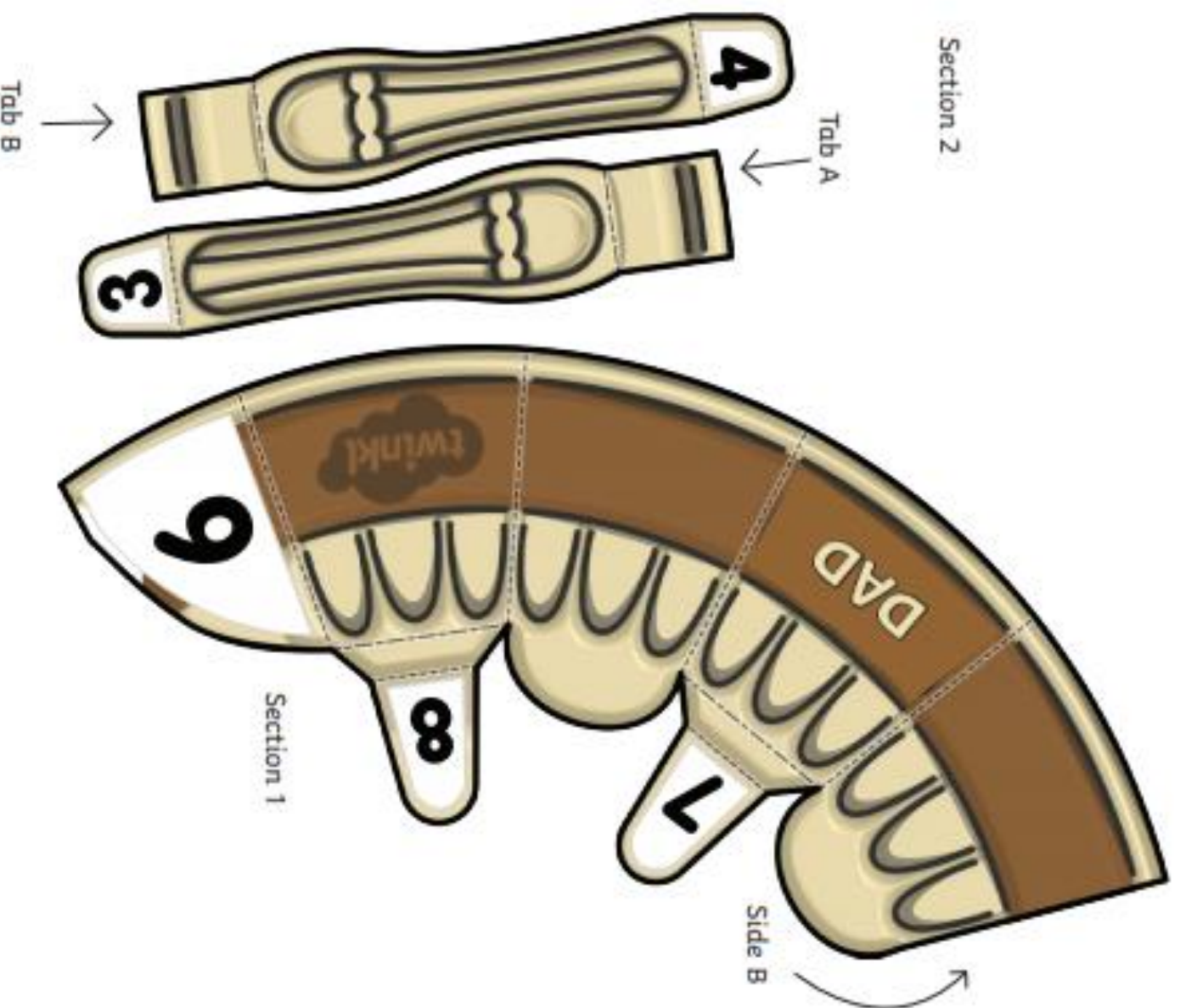

3D Father's Day Trophy Instructions

1. Cut out images 1 and 2. Make sure to note on the back the letter of each mark and tab.
2. With image 1, glue number 5 behind side A. (Align edge A with mark A)
3. With image 2, create the folds on section 1.
4. Now glue number 6 behind side B.
5. Glue number 7 inside section 3 between the marks of B and C.
6. Now glue number 8 inside section 3.
7. With image 2, create the folds.
8. Glue number 3 to number 1 on section 3 creating a 'C' shape curve and glue tab A inbetween the cup head and the base making sure you still have the 'C' shape curve.
9. Glue number 4 to number 2 on section 3 creating a 'C' shape curve and glue tab B inbetween the cup head and the base making sure you still have the 'C' shape curve.

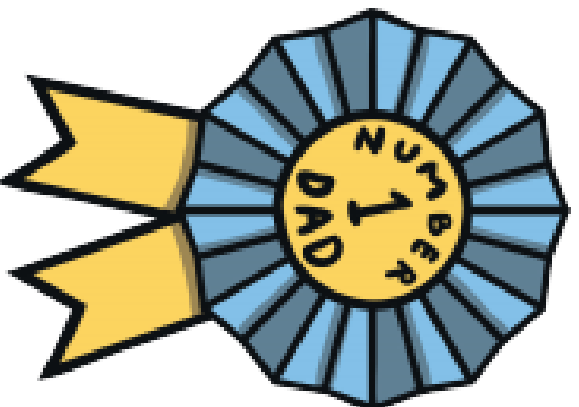

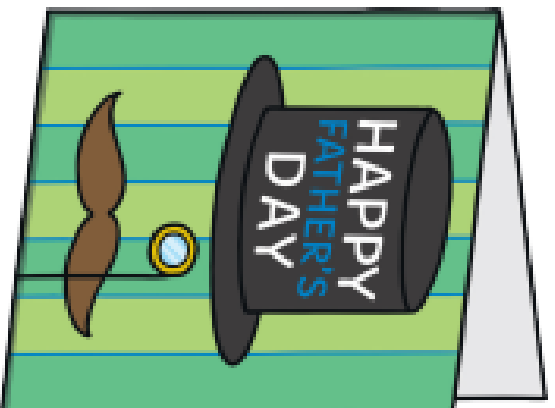
